Kentuck Knob is one of Frank Lloyd Wright's most unique Usonian homes. Guests will learn about the Hagan family, Frank Lloyd Wright, and his vision for the house. The experienced staff of tour guides share stories, historical information, and offer unique insights into this wonderful house.

Please note: The grounds at Kentuck Knob are comprised of uneven terrain, to include gravel driveways, flagstone walking paths and grassy lawns. Therefore, comfortable walking shoes are recommended.

Ohiopyle State Park & Visitor's Center

The Ohiopyle State Park & Visitor's Center offers great displays and views of the Youghiogheny River and the Ohiopyle Falls.

Whether you're new to Frank Lloyd Wright or an experienced fan, you'll get a wonderful view into the world of his Usonian designs. See both the Duncan House and Mäntylä, residences constructed in the 1950s and painstakingly moved to their current locations. Learn the history of these structures as well as their monumental preservation efforts.

Lunch included at Tree Tops Restaurant Shopping at Old General Store & Country Pie Shop Guided tour of Fallingwater

Fallingwater is a house designed in 1935 by Frank Lloyd Wright for the Kaufmann family, owners of Pittsburgh's largest department store. One of Wright's most widely acclaimed works, Fallingwater exemplifies his philosophy of organic architecture: the harmonious union of art and nature. Wright designed Fallingwater to rise above the waterfall over which it is built. Local craftsmen quarried native sandstone and other materials from the property and completed the construction of the main house, guest house and service wing in 1939. In 1963, Edgar Kaufmann Jr. donated and entrusted Fallingwater and the surrounding 469 acres of natural land to the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy., a nonprofit conservation organization.

- Expect considerable walking and standing on all guided tours. We recommend visitors wear closed-toe shoes with a rubber non-slip sole that provides both comfort and support. There is a ¼ mile walk from the Visitor Center to the house on uneven gravel surfaces. We offer a shuttle service to and from the house for visitors with mobility challenges.
- Touring the house's multiple levels requires climbing over 100 steps. For visitors unable to climb the stairs to the upper levels of the house.
- Fallingwater's site includes more than a mile of sloping gravel paths, which may be challenging for visitors with mobility limitations.
- Fallingwater is not air conditioned.

Located in the scenic Laurel Highlands, The Casino at Nemacolin offers plenty of thrilling action. <u>Day 3 Friday (B)</u> Breakfast at hotel Flight 93 National Memorial

Nearly 3,000 people tragically lost their lives. The Flight 93 National Memorial, administered by the National Park Service, serves as a permanent memorial to the 40 heroes on United Flight 93 who courageously gave their lives thwarting a planned attack on the nation's capital on September 11, 2001.
