Whalehead in Historic Corolla

Whalehead is a beautifully restored 1920s Art Nouveau style residence that is open to the public for museum tours. The grand residence, dressed in bold yellow and striking copper, stands in Historic Corolla Park and overlooks the Currituck Sound. The Whalehead invites visitors to experience its intriguing past and hear its fascinating story. The fascination begins as you step back in time to an era reminiscent of prohibition and women's rights. Learn about the life and times of the wealthy Knights who spent winters in Corolla hunting, relaxing and entertaining in this lavish cottage. The day-to-day way they lived, the guests that visited, the dinners that were served... it is a story that lives on in this beautifully restored mansion.

Currituck Beach Lighthouse

First lit on December 1, 1875, the beacon filled the remaining “dark spot” on the North Carolina coast between Cape Henry and Bodie Island lighthouses. It is one of the only lighthouses in America that still houses its original first-order Fresnel lens. The light continues to flash today at 20-second intervals, serving as a navigational aid. The beacon, which can be seen for 18 nautical miles, comes on at dusk and ceases at dawn.

Lunch on own in Corolla
Wild Horse Tour

Where the paved road ends in Corolla, you’ll find sandy beaches accessible only by 4x4 vehicles. It is on this stretch of beach from ocean to sound that is home to the legendary Corolla wild horses. The wild horses of Currituck remain the most treasured locals in the Northern Outer Banks.

Day 3 Tuesday (B,D)

Fort Raleigh on Roanoke Island

Amongst the shallow blue waters of the Outer Banks lies Fort Raleigh on Roanoke Island. Shaped by constant winds of change, Fort Raleigh has become a focal point of American history. From the first Algonquian-speaking people to the first English colonies, from formerly enslaved people starting anew to an inventor testing new radio technology, this island continues to be a place to forge new paths.

Guided tour of Elizabeth Gardens

The Elizabethan Gardens in Manteo, North Carolina, are a stunning botanical treasure located on Roanoke Island within the historic Fort Raleigh National Historic Site. Created by The Garden Club of North Carolina, the gardens were designed as a living memorial to the first English colonists who attempted to settle in the New World over 400 years ago. Highlights include; Colorful seasonal flower displays and ancient live oaks draped in Spanish moss, A magnificent Queen Elizabeth I bronze statue, symbolizing the connection to England's Elizabethan era, Elegant fountains, manicured lawns, and scenic sound front views and peaceful walking paths, perfect for photography or quiet reflection.

Day 4 Wednesday (B)

Wright Brothers Memorial

Come experience the place where two young brothers from Dayton, Ohio experimented with flight in the early 1900s, and finally succeeded on a cold winter day with the world's first controlled, sustained, powered, heavier-than-air flight. Exploring the grounds gives you an opportunity to see reproductions of the brothers' 1903 camp buildings, stand at the place where Wilbur and Orville Wright first took to the air in their 1903 flyer and landed, and climb Big Kill Devil Hill to see the nation's monument commemorating the brothers' historic achievement. You can also take in an interpretive program on the brothers and examine the replica of the 1903 flyer.

Cape Hatteras National Seashore

Cape Hatteras National Seashore is a breathtaking stretch of protected coastline along North Carolina's Outer Banks, known for its unspoiled natural beauty, iconic lighthouses, and rich maritime history. Spanning more than 70 miles of barrier islands, Cape Hatteras features pristine beaches, rolling dunes, salt marshes, and diverse wildlife habitats.

Cape Hatteras Lighthouse

Cape Hatteras Lighthouse, is the tallest brick lighthouse in the United States, famous for its striking black-and-white spiral design and sweeping views of the Atlantic Ocean. The Cape Hatteras Lighthouse protects one of the most hazardous sections of the Atlantic Coast. Offshore of Cape Hatteras, the Gulf Stream collides with the Virginia Drift, a branch of the Labrador Current from Canada. This current forces southbound ships into a dangerous twelve-mile long sandbar called Diamond Shoals. Hundreds and possibly thousands of shipwrecks in this area have given it the reputation as the *Graveyard of the Atlantic*.

Graveyard of the Atlantic Museum

The Graveyard of the Atlantic Museum in Hatteras is named in honor of the thousands of shipwrecks that rest in the waters off North Carolina's coast and is dedicated to the preservation and presentation of the state's coastal and shipwreck history.
